

## Advanced Placement Exams

The following is a listing of the A.P. Exams ordered and the total cost paid out per course for the past three years. (Please keep in mind that Exeter High School students taking an A.P. course are not required to take the exam, although most do.)

### 2003-2004:

English Literature & Composition: 17 students took the exam and paid \$1,394.00  
(\$82.00 dollars is the cost of each exam with \$8.00 going into the school's A.P. account.)

French Language: 11 students taking the exam at a total cost of \$902.00

Spanish Language: 9 students taking the exam at a total cost of \$738.00

U. S. History: 36 students taking the exam at a total cost of \$2,952.00  
(73 exams were ordered)

### 2004-2005:

French Language: 9 students paid \$738.00

Spanish Language: 15 students paid \$1,230.00

English Literature & Composition: 19 students paid \$1558.00  
(43 exams were ordered)

### 2005-2006:

Spanish Language: 13 students paid \$1066.00

English Language & Composition: 11 students paid \$902.00

English Literature & Composition: 5 students paid \$410.00

U.S. Gov't & Politics: 6 students paid \$492.00

Comp. Gov't & Politics: 8 students paid \$656.00

(43 Exams were ordered)

In the current 2006-2007 school year, there has been an increase in A.P. courses resulting in eight being offered with a total number of 242 students enrolled in these classes.

At the last board meeting I was asked by Mr. Chisholm if I knew the reason there was a large increase in students in Math Lab this year over last year. Here is what I found out:

a. The criteria used to identify students for placement in Math Lab for school year 2005-2006 was Grade 6 NHEIAP (novice) and Spring 2005 NWEA RIT score (two grade levels below peers).

b. The criteria used to identify students for placement in Math Lab for school year 2006-2007 was 8th Grade NECAP Achievement Level 1 (substantially below proficient) and Spring 2006 NWEA RIT score (two grade levels below peers).

The criteria we used last year was more current allowing us to capture more students.
